Abstract

"One of the most dramatic discoveries in the history of medicine occurred in our department of Physiology in 1921. Millions of lives were saved."

Prof. Vranic will explain why this miracle happened at the University of Toronto and not elsewhere, despite the fact that some 50 laboratories around the world were also trying to discover this important hormone. Over the last 90 years, there were frequent discussions about whether the Nobel prizes should have been awarded to others in this field. The most interesting story is that of Paulesco, a Romanian, and the dramatic events which followed when the Romanians tried to get credit for the discovery of insulin. Mladen is privileged to have been the last post-doctoral fellow of Professor Charles H. Best, who was the most well-known Canadian when Mladen immigrated to Canada. He has been fortunate to have been Chairman of the department where this discovery took place so many years ago. The discovery of insulin was dramatic, which made the relationship complicated between the discoverers. Mladen will end his lecture by showing the effect of the discovery on the whole University of Toronto and a large number of crucial discoveries in biology due to insulin. Prof. Vranic chaired the celebration of the 75th and 90th anniversary of the discovery of insulin and he plans to be around for the 100th anniversary which will take place in 7 years.
